

From Erie, Pa., to the Rhine—and Back! Read this Story of the Lewis Box that Went to War

Lieutenant Floyd W. Sence, who was instrumental in the return of this box from overseas service, writes as follows:

In answer to your letter of inquiry acc cerning the War History will endeavor to give you a short outline of its service abroad.

It originally became attached to its organization, Battery C-150th F. A., through the services of the Erie (Pa.) Chapter of the Red Cross in September, 1917. It came aboard the troop train at that place, filled with sandwiches and bearing the compliments of the local Red Cross Unit.

On arrival at Camp Mills, L. I., it was put into service as a bread box and later carried kitchen utensils on board the U.S.S. President Lincoln bound for overseas service, eventually reaching the front in its old capacity as bread box and in company with its battery in the Luneville Sector on February 28, 1918.

From then on, until November 11, 1918, it was either actually at the front or engaged in moving from one sector to another. During this time, it went through the Champaign defensive, July 14, 1918, Chateau-Thierry

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offensive July August 1918, St. Mihiel offennd Argonne-Meuse

Circa 1920 Unensive, September-1907 ember, 1918. Thence, still accompanying its battery with the Army of Occupation into Germany.

Returning to the States, via Brest, on board the U.S.S. Leviathan, to Camp Merritt, the box was later returned to its original donors, the Erie Chapter Red Cross, as the Battery passed through that city on its way to the point of Demobilization.

On its arrival home, your box was the possessor of three gold service chevrons denoting eighteen months of foreign service, October 18, 1918, to April 25, 1919, and one wound chevron earned when hit by shell fragment while in the Argonne Forest. It also sports the divisional insignia, "The Rainbow".

Fm sure if Distinguished Service Medals were being awarded lowly boxes, your "Soldier Box" would rate one, for it certainly did give faithful and long service to Battery C-150th F. A., Rainbow Division.
