ABOUT OUR BUSINESS by G. G. Frater

We are approaching the summer period which is normally the slowest of our business year. We feel that this year, however, will be different and if our program works out as we now believe that it will, we would be more apt to increase our payroll than decrease it.

The Plastic Department will be in full production soon. The people in Milwaukee who make the steel frames for the Quartermaster box have caused us delays beyond any understanding. The tote boxes off of our own dies are going out on sample orders we have had in the office for some time. If the acceptance of this size and shape of container proves satisfactory, then it is very probable that another press may have to be installed as soon as it can be obtained. In the meantime, there will be continuous production on the Quartermaster contract.

The Box Dept. continues to bring in orders to maintain production about equal to last year. An upturn in business over the country that is being predicted by some could be helpful in increasing the production of this department. We are not heartily in accord with this prediction and do not place too much confidence in it.

Bee supplies are selling way ahead of a year ago. We had estimated and prepared for some increase in sales over last year but had not produced enough finished merchandise for the business we are receiving. Fortunately, we do have lumber and materials in good supply and overtime in this department will probably cover our needs satisfactorily. Empty warehouses at the end of the season will give us work to fill them again through the fall and winter.

The Venetian blind dept. is definitely the weak department. Contrary to our expectations the Venetian blind slats have sold very poorly and as far as we can tell we see no evidence of a change in the immediate future.

The golf ball washer is selling at a normal rate and we believe that these sales will be as good as last year.

The ups and downs of our various de-

partments indicate to us the advantage of manufacturing more than one or two products. If we were, for example, manufacturers of Venetian blind slats and had no other products, our business at this time would be so bad that we would be able to keep very few of the normal number of employees at work. Our varied production is definitely an advantage in maintaining a fairly good level of employment.

The fourth annual meeting of the 25 year club was held May 6 at the Green Bowl. About 30 people were there and had a very enjoyable time. John Gruel, Elmer Reinhard and Charles Ebert (retired employees) were present and all three seem to thrive on the "no work" formula... Musical selections were furnished by the Kirsch Foundry Four from Beaver Dam—a group of fine barbershop harmonizers.
